February 28

Native American Tales

Natives of North America had a rich oral tradition. We've chosen stories from the Algonquin nation to reflect the culture of those living here before the 17th Century.

American Jezebel: The Uncommon Life of Anne Hutchinson

by Eve LaPlante

In 1637, a 46-year-old midwife, pregnant with her 16th child, stands before 40 male judges of the Massachusetts General Court, charged with heresy and sedition. This is a true story of a woman whose rebellious and unconventional spirit shaped our state.

April 18

Oliver Wiswell, by Kenneth Roberts

An historical novel about the Loyalists during the Revolution. We will read the first part, which is set in Milton.

May 16

Between the World and Me

by Ta-nehisi Coates

Written in the form of a letter to his son, Coates' short book takes a powerful look at race relations in the U.S. A National Book Award winner and Pulitzer prize finalist.

June 20 – Double Feature!

Home Movie, by Jennifer De Leon

This short story about a Guatemalan immigrant family's struggle to assimilate was a 2015 Boston "One City, One Story" selection. De Leon is a Boston area teacher.
