Books for the 2022 – 2023 season

October 3, 2022

The Moonlight Child by Karen McQuestion

Eighteen-year-old Niki, a former foster child notices suspicious activity at the Flemings' house (neighbor). The perfect blend of mystery, suspense, and tender moments of love - a gripping and emotional novel that will leave you wondering about your neighbors and foster care.

November 7, 2022

The Red Island House by Andrea Lee

A sweeping novel about marriage and loyalty, identity and heritage, fate and freedom - a powerhouse literary voice and an extravagantly lush, enchanted world on a fictitious Madagascar island.

December 5, 2022

Murder in the Rue Dumas by M.L. Longworth

Second book in the delightful Verlaque and Bonnet mystery series - a page-turning whodunit set in a small community of theology students and professors in Aix-en Provence, France.

February 6, 2023

The Island of Missing Trees by Elif Shafak

A rich, magical book on belonging and identity, love and trauma, nature and renewal. Two teenagers, a Greek Cypriot and a Turkish Cypriot, meet at a taverna on an island and grow in their forbidden love for each other.

March 6, 2023

Klara and the Sun by by Kazuo Ishiguro

Klara is an Artificial Friend with outstanding observational qualities - a look at our rapidly changing modern world while exploring a fundamental question: what does it mean to love?

April 3, 2022

How Beautiful We Were by Imbolo Mbue

Told through the perspective of a generation of children and the family of a girl named Thula who grows up to become a revolutionary - the collision of a small fictitious African village and an America oil company- an unforgettable story of a community on the wrong end of Western greed.

May 1, 2023

Horse by Geraldine Brooks

A discarded painting in a junk pile, a skeleton in an attic, and the greatest racehorse in American history: from these strands, a sweeping story of spirit, obsession, and injustice across American history. Based on the remarkable true story of the record-breaking thoroughbred Lexington, is a novel of art and science, love and obsession, and our unfinished reckoning with racism.
